

Start: Corner Coronation Road and Church Road, Mangere Bridge Village

1. Follow Coronation Road north .
2. Turn right > into Waterfront Road.
3. Turn left < onto walkway, and follow the walkway around to the right > and under the motorway bridge.
4. Exit into Mahuranga Drive.
5. Turn right > into Hastie Avenue. Cross the motorway over the bridge.
6. Continue straight ahead, beside Mangere Domain.
7. Follow the side-road and turn left < into Taylor Road.
8. Turn right > into Scott Avenue.
9. At the reserve at the end, cross over Kiwi Esplanade and turn right > onto walkway.
10. Follow the walkway along the harbour edge.
11. Turn right > into Coronation Road to return to the start.

Mangere Bridge Loop

Description: Mainly level paths, including ramp to bridge over the motorway. Suitable for users of average fitness and mobility.

To see: Views of Manukau Harbour, One Tree Hill, Mangere Mountain; Pukeko and shore birds habitat.

Time: approx. 60 minutes. (about 5.5 kms)

Parking: Coronation Road, Mangere Bridge

Mangere Bridge Township is a small community with about 9,000 inhabitants. Its population is diverse, which brings with it a range of activities. Add to that its location near the Manukau Harbour (the second largest natural harbour in New Zealand), Ambury Park and Mangere Mountain, and you will find a wide range of cultural, sports, and recreational activities.

The area is steeped in history and has a rich cultural heritage stemming from Maori settlement in the early 1800's through to a vibrant Chinese market gardening community and European settlement. Many of the local roads are named after large farming families that settled in the area in the late 1800's. Descendents of some of these well-known families still own a number of the buildings.
