

**Start:** Mitre 10 Car park, 72 Lunn Avenue, Mount Wellington

1. Turn left < from the car park entrance along Lunn Avenue
2. Cross Lunn Avenue at next set of traffic lights and continue along Lunn Avenue
3. Turn right > into Ngahue Drive
4. Turn right > into Magma Crescent
5. Just before the road bends to the left, turn right > along the track and look out for a well marked track heading down the slope
6. Turn right > into Barbarich Drive and continue to the pathway around Maungarei Springs Wetlands
7. Follow the pathway around the wetland ponds and exit on the opposite side into Stonefields Avenue
8. Turn right > into Kauriki Terrace
9. Next right > into Korere Terrace
10. Next right > into Tihi Street
11. At the corner of Tihi Street and Papango Street, turn up The Goldsbury Track (gravel Gollan Road Pedestrian Trail)
12. Follow The Goldsbury Track until you reach Gollan Road
13. Continue along Gollan Road
14. Turn right > into Harding Avenue
15. Cross Lunn Avenue at the traffic intersection, turn right > along Lunn Avenue to return to the start

Stonefields is at the base of Mount Wellington. The volcanic site was formed 9000 years ago. It was used as a village by the Maori with evidence dating back 600 years ago. Winstones Limited began quarrying stone here back in 1936—and much of the stone was used for building Auckland. In 2001 the site was sold and is still in development as a large residential area.
